

Jocelyn Ann Campbell sits on the Ville-Marie borough council and on the Board of Directors of the Société de transport de Montréal (STM), having received a second mandate in the election of November 1, 2009. She also represents the citizens of the Saint-Sulpice district on both the Ahuntsic-Cartierville borough council and the Montréal city council.

During her first mandate from 2005 to 2009, she was an associate councillor on the City's executive committee (social development and the family), a member of the commission on major equipment and agglomeration activities, a member of the Communauté métropolitaine de Montréal's commission on social housing, a member of the executive committee of the Regional Conference of Elected Officers of Montréal and Chair of the *Nourrir Montréal* committee. She was also a member of the steering committee for the policy, *Pour une participation égalitaire des femmes et des hommes à la vie de Montréal*.

At the borough level, Jocelyn Ann Campbell acted as Chair of the Urban Planning Advisory Committee and was a member of the executive of the Ahuntsic-Cartierville Community Economic Development Corporation. She led the drive to establish the local Issue Table on public safety and emergency preparedness. She has also been very active in her district in local collaborative efforts such as Solidarité Saint-Simon and Concertation Saint-Sulpice.

At the time of her election in 2005, Madam Campbell occupied the post of Communications Director at the Palais des congrès de Montréal, with responsibility for internal and external communications as well as public relations.

...projects that improve the quality of life of citizens. To that end, the councillor for the district of Saint-Sulpice supports several projects. In addition to the re-design of Chabanel Street, the new residential project at Places l'Acadie and Henri-Bourassa and the implementation of a new traffic plan (directions of streets, cycling lanes) in the Saint-Simon sector, Madam Campbell would like to make school routes safer. Housing for seniors with decreasing independence is at the heart of her concerns. "Housing is still a challenge in my district," emphasized Madam Campbell. A woman who knows how to dialogue and how to listen, she will bring partners and citizens together to get projects underway, particularly in Domaine Saint-Sulpice and Saint-Simon.
